# CAMPION HOUSE

In the past month, several activities in the college touched the heart of UAP of the Society. Keeping in mind the 4th UAP, taking care of our common home, SXC Eco Club in collaboration with Biology Department organized the Environment Week – 2019, from 2nd to 7th May. Various activities, competitions, and awareness programs were conducted in college. The most attractive of it all was an inter-class PowerPoint presentation competition on the theme of the World Environment Day 2019, Beat air pollution.

Jomon conducted a two-day retreat for twenty-five teaching staff of the morning shift and a three-day retreat for forty teaching staff of the day shift from 19th to 23rd of May. The retreat is part of a five phased program on Ignatian spirituality, called Shared Vision, prepared and promoted by the British Province.

There were three Rural Immersion Camps (RICs) in June. The first year students of Bachelors in Business Studies (BBS) went to B Shree Sarada Higher Secondary School in Barhabise, Sindhupalchok on 31st May and 1st June; the sixth semester students of Bachelors in Information Management (BIM) went to Shree Chandra Jyoti school in Nuwakot on the 20th of June; and the third semester students of Masters in Business Studies (MBS) went to Shree Araniko School in Dadikot, Bhaktapur on 21st June for their camp. RICs are designed in such a way that our students and staff will have an opportunity to walk with the poor, the marginalized and the excluded.

Accompanying the youth, especially our catholic students, towards a hopeful future underlines the goal of the monthly gathering of the Catholic students of the college which took place on 21st June. Held in LCR the gathering was attended by Jiju and Cap who offered mass for the students at the end of the one hour sharing on the life of St. Ignatius by Jomon. The topic for discussion for the next meeting is questions on the Bible.

At the end of May, the teaching staff had three days and the non-teaching staff had two days of annual seminar. While Mrs. Avinash Chaddha, an expert in the field of Life Management Skills training from Delhi, guided the teaching staff, Mr. Dipankar Sherpa, an expert in felicitating group building and healthy working culture in institutions guided the non-teaching staff. The A level class of 2019 had their students-parents orientation on 1 June and be-

gan their induction week the very next day. The new group seems to have blended into the Xavierian culture already.

Partnership in Education (PiE), the social outreach program of SXC, had its family day and award distribution ceremony on 8 June. On the 15th of June, the ten trainees from BSW who served the children in the past year were given a tearful farewell by the students. Eight students from BSW second year have joined the PiE family as its new trainees. Currently, PiE facilitates the education of around 65 school going children from the settlements and low-rent areas, by providing them space to study and mentors to guide them.

Fr. James Antony joined the Champion House community on 5th June. He has started off his mission by taking a few classes in Microbiology Department. Currently, he is preparing for the defence of his doctoral thesis which will be held in August in Chennai. He was formally welcomed and introduced to the members of the College Academic Council at the first Academic Council Consult (ACC) of the new academic year on 12th June.

The generosity of SXC, NJS Curia and Godavari community helped Jomon in hosting the summer gathering of the JCSA Core Team in Godavari Ashram on 14th, 15th and 16th of June. The Core Team is commissioned by POSA to reflect on the on-going socio-political-economic-religious issues of South Asia, form informed and adequate responses to these issues and recommend actions that could be implemented in and through our apostolates in South Asia. The team has fifteen members. The participants highly appreciated the hospitality of Nepal Jesuits.

Dr. Selvaraj Arulnathan, S. J. (MDU) conducted a one-day seminar on the Protection of the Minors and the Vulnerable for all the staff of the college on 17th June in two shifts. BSW had their semester-end exams in the third week of June. Jomon was happy to fill in for Sr. Stella who is attending a conference in the UK at present.

As June comes to an end, SXC looks forward to the Farewell and Award Ceremony of BSW 2015-19 Class on Friday, 28th June, the arrival of A2 students on 29th June, and conducting the admission process for about 10,000 SEE graduates who want to pursue their further studies in St. Xavier's.



## DESIDERI HOUSE

The summer program at the KU Centre for Buddhist Studies at Rangjung Yeshe Institute (RYI) is off to a good start. On June 12th we welcomed 110 summer students. The majority are graduate students from universities around the world. They come to us primarily for intensive language training they cannot get at home in Tibetan, Sanskrit, and Nepali. This summer we added classical (Buddhist literary) Chinese and Pali, taught by Bhikkhu Upali Sraman, who is a close friend of Fr Frank Clooney SJ, at Harvard. KU has also given initial approval for the introduction of Newar language courses at RYI which I am designing.

This summer the student body at RYI includes Fr Yann Vagneux, an MEP Father who is studying Nepali in our summer program. Fr Yann is well-known to many clergy and religious in Nepal. He has visited often from Varanasi, where he has lived for the past ten years, mastering Sanskrit and Hindi. During his time there he befriended many of the Nepali Brahmins who study at BHU. This situates him very well for the pursuit of Hindu-Christian dialogue in South Asia, which definitely qualifies as a “need of the hour”.

For the last year or more I have been collaborating with Professor Bruce Owens, from Wheaton College in Massachusetts, USA. Bruce has been collecting information from the Newar Buddhist monasteries in Kathmandu Valley, in order to update the information provided in Fr John Locke’s monumental work – Buddhist Monasteries of Nepal. Our intention is to republish the work, which is in high demand, with corrections and additions that Bruce and I will make.

The University of Heidelberg, in Germany, has undertaken a major project to document the artistic heritage of Nepal, especially the Kathmandu Valley. Most of what they collect will be available in the online “Database of Nepalese Art and

Monuments”, or DANAM. They are interested in incorporating the info that Prof. Owens and I provide.

They have also offered a unique alternative to traditional reprinting. The text of Fr Locke’s book will be freely available online to any user of the DANAM site. Scholars outside of Nepal who want a hard copy of the book can order one from the project. They print beautiful, but somewhat expensive, hardback editions. Within Nepal they will arrange for a local press to print a version for sale within Nepal only -- at a heavily subsidized price. This will make the text available to the many young Nepalis who’ve developed an interest in Newar Buddhism recently.

Our visitors this month included Austin Simoes-Gomes, a Portuguese-Canadian doctoral student who studied under me at RYI a few years ago. He did a study of the Newar woman at Swayambhu, Tej Maya Bauddhacharya, who is believed to channel the goddess Harati-Ajima. His excellent undergrad thesis will form the basis of his PhD dissertation. Sadly, the Swayambhu “Dya Ma”, Tej Maya, passed away on Sunday, at age 86. Our other house guest is Prof Sienna Craig, chair of the Anthropology Dept at Dartmouth College, in New Hampshire, USA. Sienna and her husband, Dr Ken Bauer, usually visit about once a year. Sienna has just returned from a month of fieldwork in Mustang, her area of specialty.

Desideri House must be a lucky place to apply for the US Diversity Visa lottery. Chandra Gurmachan, who worked with me at GAA, then helped set up Desideri House, went to the US in 2015, after winning the lottery. Last month we learned that Sunil Moktan, who lived here for a stretch after the earthquake, has also won. He has submitted all his paperwork and is waiting for an embassy interview.
