

FROM THE REGION SUPERIOR'S DESK

OVID-19 is very unfortunate. Many precious human lives are lost. It has broken the rhythm of whole socio-economic pace. It has affected the whole globe irrespective of nationality, caste, creed and gender. It is one of the severe pandemics the world has ever faced.

Positively COVID-19 has taught us to expect the unexpected. It has humbled our pride. We glorified our knowledge, successes and achievements. We put ourselves at the center and God at the edge. However, our most advanced and latest knowledge couldn't defeat a small virus. It turned the whole system topsy-turvy. It forced us to pause and review our life. Perhaps after a long time we had time to listen to birds chirping, to admire the full bloomed flowers, to look at the stars at night, and without our knowledge the words 'how great is God' escaped from our mouth. Daily temple bells and church bells couldn't take us to God, but a small virus brought us back to God. Today we thank God for being alive and for His creation. The harsh reality and experience is we are in the same storm, but not in the same boat. Some are directly affected by COVID-19 and some by its by-product, the lockdown. Like elsewhere in Nepal the hard hit of the lockdown are the daily wagers, tea garden workers and migrants. The government of Nepal is strictly following one door system in distribution of food supplies. Organizations, institutions and individuals are not allowed to distribute food provisions. However, the government encourages contribution to Prime Minister's Relief Fund of which citizens are skeptical. It is obvious that government alone cannot reach to the most affected and needy people. The corona virus killed humans, but it brought humanity active and alive. Organizations, institutions and individuals couldn't turn a blind eye and deaf ear to the plight and cries of the affected people. Different NGOs, institutions and individuals came forward to feed the daily wagers, stranded people and distribute food provisions to the most affected people in different parts of the country. Though in a small measure Nepal Jesuits too joined hands with people of goodwill, other Religious Congregations, alumni, lay collaborators and civil authorities in dry ration kits distribution and awareness campaign in different districts of Nepal.

We are often troubled, but not crushed; sometimes in doubt, but never in despair; there are many enemies, but we are never without a friend; and though badly hurt at times, we are not destroyed. (2 Cor. 4:8-9). With this spirit and immense gratitude to God Nepal Jesuits continue to be a silver lining amidst the pandemic.



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Moran Memorial School Maheshpur/ St. Xavier's Parish Maheshpur, Jhapa

ea garden workers work 6 days a week. They are paid every weekend and their food provisions do not last more than a week. Tea gardens in Jhapa districts are closed. Tea garden workers do not have work; therefore they are not paid. They are badly affected by the lockdown. Moran Memorial School Maheshpur and St. Xavier's Parish, Maheshpur distributed a package of 10 kg rice, 1 kg lentil, half liter cooking oil, 1 kg salt and a bar of washing soap per family for a week to 15 most needy families in Ward No. 6 and 7 under Bhadrapur Municipality. The following week additional 400 kg rice and 80 kg lentil and 100 liter cooking oil were distributed to 100 families in these two Wards.

In Mechi Nagar Municipality Ward No.6,



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Satighatta tea garden a package of 12 kg rice, 1 kg lentil, half liter cooking oil and 1 kg salt per family for a week was distributed to 12 tea garden families.



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St. Xavier's School Deonia, Jhapa

n Bhuttabari under Arjundhara Gaonpalika St. Xavier's Deonia distributed a package of 6 kg rice, 2 kg lentil, 1 liter cooking oil 2 kg wheat flour, 1 kg gram (chana), 1 kg salt and 2 bars of washing soap for a week to 10 tea garden families.

Likewise in Telgani a Santhali village under Birtamode Municipality a package of 6 kg rice, 2 kg




lentil, 1 liter cooking oil 2 kg wheat flour, 1 kg gram (chana), 1 kg salt and 2 bars of washing soap for a week was distributed to 21 families. Most of these people are daily wagers.

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On top of dry ration kits St. Xavier's School Deonia donated NRS. 150,000/to Birtamode Municipality COVID-19 Relief Fund.

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


Godavari Municipality invited organizations, institutions and individuals to share food provisions with the most affected people in the Municipality. Each Ward welcomed cash and kind from organizations, institutions and individuals. St. Xavier's School Godavari distributed a package of 25 kg rice, 10 kg lentil, 3 liter cooking oil, 1 kg salt and 5 bars of washing soap to 10 families for 20 days in Ward No. 3.

Nepal Jesuit Society distributed 900 kg rice, 100 kg lentil, 50 liter cooking oil and 50 kg salt to 48 migrated families in Lubhu, Ward No. 6 under Mahalaxmi Municipality and 524 kg, 66 kg lentil, 38 liter cooking oil and 38 kg salt to 38 migrated families in Goldunga, Ward No. 5 under Kathmandu Municipality.

One of the most hard hit groups of lockdown is the differently abled people. In coordination with Bright Star Society that works with the visually impaired people Nepal Jesuit Society distributed 150 kg rice, 30 kg lentil, 30 liter cooking oil, 30 kg salt, 30 kg flattened rice, 30 kg gram (chana), 30 kg tea leaves, 30 kg sugar and 150 packet biscuits

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families of visually impaired people in Kathmandu, Bhaktapur and Kavre district. In Gurbhakot Municipality, Surkhet, West Nepal families displaced by flood are living in huts. They are daily wagers. They cannot come out in search of work due to lockdown. In coordination with Sisters of Charity of Nazareth Nepal Jesuit Society distributed a package of 10 kg rice, 2 kg lentil, 2 liter cooking oil, 2 bars of washing soap for a week to 45 displaced families.

Nepal Jesuit Society runs Mobile Clinic in 15 districts of Nepal in collaboration with different Women Religious Congregations. Sisters of Charity of Nazareth (SCN) and Sisters of Charity (SCCG) conducted awareness programmes in different Mobile Clinic Centers in Dailekh and Surkhet districts in West Nepal and in Dhadhing district.



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ne of the problems faced by Red Cross Society in lockdown is shortage of blood. Willing donors cannot come out to donate blood. GAA organized 50 Emergency Door to Door Blood Donation Camp and collected 3200 pints of blood and donated to Red Cross Society. Likewise in the beginning there was shortage of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for the medical personnel. GAA donated 150 PPE sets to different hospitals in Kathmandu. It also distributed 300 masks to Nepal police and dry ration kits to 300 families of visually impaired and HIV positive.



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
