Tanuary has been a very productive and busy month for the NJSI staff primarily focused on fieldwork. As we are heading towards the Fe y Algeria movement, we are in an early stage of planning to improve the quality of education in the schools we've previously collaborated with. We have carefully chosen eight schools for this initiative based on factors like proximity, large student populations, strong coordination, solid relationships with staff, a focus on secondary education,

and previous involvement with the REIN project. These schools are located in various districts: two in Dhadhing, two in Kavre, and one each in Ramechhapp, Gorkha, Sindhupalchowk, and Dolakha. Our staff were scattered in different locations to collect in-depth data from these schools. We collected information from a various stakeholder, including school principals, teachers, students, members of the School Management Committee (SMC), Parents Teachers Association (PTA) members, parents, ward chairpersons, and Education Officers from the Rural Municipality. We had a sort of questionnaire for each individ-

ual. We used the method of one-to-one interviews, group discussions, observations, and secondary data analysis. We are almost at the end of the completion of collecting the data. From the next month, we will be engrossed in setting the data in a structure and more in the analytical part. Additionally, NJSI staff have been holding regular online meetings with Xavier, our consultant, to strategize the next steps. Xavier has been a great guide in our efforts to improve the quality of education in rural Nepal.






